Our new Union Headquarters, including our Union Hall—and the construction spanning several blocks surrounding it, is the culmination of years of planning in conjunction with the City, our investment partners, and Local 38 Business Manager Larry Mazzola Jr.

"I'm so excited to have a new building that will stand as a monument to innovation and the hard work displayed by our Local 38 members and staff." Mazzola, Jr. said. "The proud legacy of Local 38 will live on in this new building, and because of our partnership with Strada and the plans to incorporate affordable housing into this project, we're sharing dignity and respect with the surrounding community as we grow our presence on Market Street."


When all is said and done, the project will bring new life to the entire area and surrounding neighborhood. The plan includes almost 600 units of housing, a 100-unit supportive housing project for formerly homeless individuals, a new 30,000 sq. ft. Union Hall, a park to serve the entire "Hub" area and surrounding neighbors, and 17,000 sq. ft. of neighborhood-serving retail. This undertaking is a model of partnerships among the private, public and non-profit sectors—displaying the power of leveraging private investment to create a broad range of public benefits.

The first phase of the project includes the new Union Hall and the first market rate building. Followed shortly by the supportive housing building at 53 Colton, and 2 more market-rate buildings. The last phase will involve the renovation of the Civic Center Hotel. Total construction time is estimated to take 3-4 years, with the first buildings coming on-line in approximately 18-24 months.

PROJECT HIGHLIGHTS

- O Almost 500 units of desperately needed market-rate rental housing.
- O Funding to permanently preserve existing affordable housing units.
- O Delivery of a 96-unit supportive housing project with no City funding.

 Delivery of a 33,000 square foot publicly accessible park with no City funding.
 - O Creation of over 1,800 jobs.
- O Local 38 and Strada agreed to let the City use the Civic Center Hotel as a the City's first Navigation Center on Private Property until the supportive housing project is complete.

The Past

A history of service to labor, the community and Local 38

Local 38 inherited it's headquarters building from UA Local 590, when four UA locals were merged to form Local 38 in 1947. On the right is a photo of the building looking east on Market St. in 1940. As you can see from the sign on the side of the building. It was originally built as a Moose Club (Source: SFMTA Archives), inset is the building as it currently looks. Throughout its Local 38 history the headquarters has become a familiar landmark, particularly during local, state and even national political campaigns, with banners voicing the support of the Local 38 Committee of Political Education (COPE) for numerous candidates.

Our UA Local 38 Union Hall, located at 1621 Market St. in San Francisco, has been a central organizing hub for workers over the years.

The building itself—a two-story reinforced concrete public assembly and office building—was originally constructed in 1923 by the O'Brien Brothers to serve as the Loyal Order of Moose Hall and Club. The total cost was estimated to be

\$100,000.

The new lodge was dedicated in a ceremony in 1923, including a circus held on the first block of 12th Street, between Market and Mission Streets, and a parade. The dedication itself was reportedly attended by 5,000 people.

In 1945 Local 590, the Marine Pipefitters, were headquartered in the building, and in 1947, when four pipe trades locals

Until the current COVID quarantine, the San Francisco Labor Council held their monthly meetings at the Local 38 hall, as well as all their political campaign gatherings.

When Local 38 took over the building it housed Local 590, a school for the bartenders union, and a suite of law offices.

Over the years the union expanded to fill the building, setting up a full fledged training center in 1978 (prior to that appren-


